


Year 8 book recommendations:

British spy Charles Henderson tries to reach them first, but he can only do it with the help of a twelve-year-old French orphan.


The British secret service is about to discover that kids working undercover will help to win the war.


For official purposes, these children do not exist.


Skulduggery Pleasant by Derek Landy


She's twelve. He's dead. But together they're going to save the world. Hopefully.


The Bone Sparrow by Zana Fraillon

An alien threat is on the horizon, ready to strike. And if humanity is to provide the government must create the greatest military commander in history.


I The brilliant young Ender Wiggin is their last hope. But first he must survive the rigours of a brutal military training program - to prove that he can be the leader of all leaders.


A saviour for mankind must be produced, through whatever means possible. But are they creating a hero or a monster?
