Hopefully, these will provide extra spaces for our local wildlife to thrive and we will be monitoring their success over the coming years.



Quick insight into teaching Communication and interaction in the Specialist Centre


Communication and interaction is a key part of the curriculum in the Specialist Centre. Students that attend the Specialist Centre have an EHCP (Education and Health Care Plan) together with a diagnosis of Autism and/or SLCN needs. The curriculum is designed to equip our students with the necessary tools to deal with situations they may find difficult or challenging. As a team we work towards enabling them to understand and function in the world we live in, to the best of their abilities and as independently as possible.

One way to help our students is to teach them how to navigate friendships more easily. One way of doing this is for our students to be involved in strategy games which can help with brain development.



Friendships help our students develop important life skills such as getting along with other people and dealing with challenges and problems. Students with these skills are less likely to have social and emotional difficulties later in life. Activities such as cards games, problem solving games and circle time play a big part in how students connect with others and this supports them in making friends.

Studies have found that activity in the brain involving the **amygdala** and **posterior cingulate cortex** have evolved to help us make snap decisions about people. The amygdala has been linked with emotional regulation, and the posterior cingulate cortex is active when assigning value to situations.



In Communication and Interaction lessons we encourage our students to communicate interactively with each other so they can make reasoned decisions and not snap decisions. They ask questions, they must listen carefully to other students' instructions and should be courteous without becoming impatient or frustrated. Students also learn how to take turns, follow directions, cooperate and concentrate.



Public Living Room


We opened our 'Public Living Room' to provide a friendly space for people to come and have a hot drink, play games, read a book, do some work, charge their phones and meet others.

Our first project 'JellyTech Academy' saw the students running a drop in session for over 60s to come and seek support for their electronic devices. The elders who came along really enjoyed speaking with the students over a





The Oasis nine habits

My Child's First Device

5 Steps to Make Phones, Tablets, and Laptops Safer this Christmas

This Christmas might be the time you're deciding to give your child their first phone, tablet, or laptop (or third, fourth, fifth – even a new update). This is a big decision! The responsibility and freedom that comes with owning a device is a big step for children – and you! It might even be their first “grown up” responsibility.

As a parent or carer, it's important to remember that even if a child is tech-savvy, they need to be taught how to be tech-safe. We know this can be daunting with various device brands, apps, and settings to choose from.
